From the Director's Desk

Dear Library Patron, Friend and Investor,

This is written to ask you to assist your Library in continuing to serve you and your fellow citizens of this great community. We are reaching out to ask for your support, and to remind you of some of the wonderful accomplishments and numerous services the Abington Free Library and Roslyn Branch have offered to the citizens of Abington - and beyond as the Number 1 library in the MCLINC consortium. We also need to tell you about the ongoing challenge we face in light of serious funding reductions due to State budget cuts both this and last year.

The Abington Township Public Library set another record this past year for both levels of patronage and delivery of services. Almost 400,000 users (along with 350,000 virtual users who entered through our website www.abingtonfreelibrary.org) entered our doors to utilize books, magazines, DVDs, downloadable books, access the Internet, or just to revel in the quiet buzz of learning and share in the Library's unique sense of community.

The funding shortfalls means the Library needs your assistance to continue offering programs that meet all Abington residents' interests. Programs like adult and children's book discussions, Abington Reads!, Doggone Good Readers, pre-school education and story times, free lectures, Baby Days, World War II lectures, teen journaling classes, and on and on. This list does not come close to covering the more than 300 programs the library offered last year, including, for example, all that is accomplished in our Adult Literacy Program, which makes a significant difference to hundreds of lives.

The most recent State budget cut funding to libraries dramatically, and it impacts our ability to provide this unmatched variety of programming. Therefore, your investment in and commitment to the Library is essential to assure that important services and unique programs are not curtailed. Please invest, give, donate or bequeath, to the full extent of your capabilities. Your gift will help us meet the needs of the more than a thousand families, students, teachers, children, and seniors who visit our Library each day.

We are here to assist you with your computer questions, find and reserve books, begin research or help identify a science fair project. As science fair season approaches, we are happy to



have a new five-volume resource to offer: **Experiment Central: understanding** scientific principles through projects (2nd ed.) by M. Rae Nelson. Begin a keyword search in our online catalog using terms such as "experiment central" and "acid rain," or "experiment central" and "magnetism" and you will find this source. The books are located in the Reference Collection at 507.8 NEL 2010.

Another great resource for science experiments is Science Online (developed by Facts on File). This resource can be accessed by all patrons in the library, and Abington Township residents can also access it remotely. Science Online can be found at: http://abg.mclinc.org/ information/databases/ScienceOnline.htm. Additional help for science research is available through the POWER Library, an online resource funded by the state. Two relevant databases within the POWER Library are Science Full Text Select and the "Science" section of SIRS Discoverer, designed for students in grades one through nine.



Our Adult Literacy Program helps over a hundred students improve their reading, writing and math skills. We also help students prepare for their high school equivalency diploma, the GED, and other tests. Those whose native language is not English benefit from our services, too. In

addition to individual tutoring sessions, they can attend Conversation Please! classes on Monday nights and Tuesday mornings, and our new ESL class, English Literacy and Civics, on Thursdays.

We will offer training for new tutors in the spring (most likely in April). Support meetings for all tutors are offered once a month, along with weekly scheduled training opportunities in the area.

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Volunteer Spotlight - Lydia Parke

Just how important are the Friends of the Abington Library? Consider the story of Lydia Parke, the president of the Friends group (also the past vice president, past recording secretary and yes, even past president). She is a second-generation Friend. Her mother, Betty Macht, was instrumental in establishing Abington Free Library in its current location.

Lydia grew up in Abington and attended the Abington schools. She went to Skidmore College in upstate New York and found that her schooling had prepared her well for college. Lydia majored in biology in college and earned a master's in microbiology from Hahnemann. When her children were small she took a part-time job in an ophthalmologist's office in Jenkintown and eventually became the surgical coordinator.

That experience led her to accept a parttime job as research coordinator at the Philadelphia College of Optometry (now Salus University).

In that position, she coordinated interesting research projects studying the benefits of vision screening in preschoolers. Working through the Head Start program in Philadelphia, her research eventually determined that lay screeners could be trained

to accurately identify children who needed further examinations.

When that project ended, she became the manager of regulatory affairs for Salus University, assuring that all research met federal standards for safety. She has since been promoted to the position of assistant director for research.

Lydia joined the Friends when her children were small and attending story times at the library. Her children attended all the programs the library had to offer and were avid participants in the Summer Reading Club. Helping out was a way of giving back.

One of her favorite programs is the Design a Bookmark contest, now in its third year. Prizes are given out in all grades, from kindergarten to 12th, and the winning designs are printed and handed out at both Abington Library and the Roslyn Branch.

The Friends also run the Book Cellar, which was one of the first library book sales to become pretty much a full-time operation, a book store instead of a book sale. They also sponsor the wonderful election day bake sales, an annual silent auction of jewelry, and many other fun fund-raisers. Out of that, they have donated many thousands of dollars to the library, funding such things as the Computer Center and the electronic display sign on Old York Road.

In her spare time, Lydia enjoys relaxing with her couch potato Bouvier, an 80-pound dog who likes to, well, sit in her lap!
