Dear Library Friend and Patron,

A wise philosopher said, Change is the only constant in life. We at Abington Township Public Libraries look back on 2014 as a year of continuing changes, but also at how well we believe we've met them: responding to the varied demands and uses made of our libraries, anxiety-producing changes in the funding provided by the Commonwealth, and even unexpected changes called for by a failed boiler and emergency generator (nibbled at by a trespassing rabbit!)

Throughout it all, however, there is the constancy of our reliably dedicated Library staff, which never ceases to amaze in its imagination, creativity and service, the Township community outstanding print and audio/ whose use has made us the busiest and most dynamic library in MCLINC, and of course you, the Library Friend and Patron, upon whose generous and consistent support we rely.

Earlier this year, the Library conducted a survey to which over 800 responded with remarkable results: 98.5% said that the Library is important to their family, and 99.3% rated the Library as important to the community. We are exceptionally pleased that these very high numbers indicate such a high level of support for the library and the role it plays in the community.

We believe these positive responses follow from our varied and imaginative programs, ranging from a meditation class, to a Flower Arranging Workshop, a program in learning Basic Chinese, one-on-one computer classes, our remarkably well-

received teen and children's reading clubs, our so-necessary Adult Literacy Program, and our beloved canine programs, Doggone Good Readers and Bark Pals.

Moreover, in recent months the Library built two small meeting rooms for additional quiet study space, increased summer hours, bumped up Wi-Fi coverage and speed, and added more space at the Roslyn Branch. Even as we write, the Library Board and staff are studying new and diverse ideas for innovative space use and programming. We hope you'll continue to look to our libraries for the constancy we offer in dedicated service, imaginative programming, an video collection, and as an invaluable resource for your family and our community.

As we conclude 2014, we ask that you again consider the Abington Township Public Library in your year-end gift-giving plans, to help us as we confront the challenge of the constancy of change. (Of course, your contributions may result in tax benefits for you if made by the end of the year.) Your own constancy in supporting the Library in the past has been appreciated, and we thank you for your continued support in our effort to ensure the Abington Township Public Libraries remain an exemplary community resource.

For over 30 years, the Adult Literacy Program has been pairing trained volunteer tutors with adults who want to improve their literacy skills. Last year our tutors helped over 150 area adults increase their job prospects and gain confidence through the program.



Our tutors help students improve their reading and writing skills and prepare for the GED and other tests. They also work with residents who are learning English for the first time. We offer smallgroup classes, allowing English language learners to practice their English skills as they learn about our government and culture.

Staff Spotlight - Dimitra Seiler

Every day, the doors to the library open to a treasure house of books, CDs, Play-Aways, DVDs and magazines, as well as story times, book discussions, journaling and many other wonderful programs for all ages. Not only that, but our website is "open" 24 hours a day, allowing patrons to download e-books, request books, renew books, look a bachelor's degree in business up information or even learn a foreign language.

It seems magical, but it's not. It's actually the result of a lot of people working together, and one of the main players on this team is our Fiscal Manager, Dimitra Seiler. Dimitra juggles just about every financial aspect of the library, from payroll to vendor payments, petty cash to major bills, bank accounts, savings funds, treasurer's reports, budget preparations and the annual State Aid report. She keeps track of an amazing amount of information and can produce the receipt for that printer you bought two years ago in about two seconds flat.

Dimitra was born right here in Abington Hospital and grew up in Glenside, before moving to Warminster in 5th grade. She moved back in time to graduate from Cheltenham High School. She went to Montgomery County Community College for two years, then graduated from Temple University with administration. She held a variety of jobs in her career, starting as an entrepreneurial baby-sitting teen and, later, as an accountant, a property manager and a tax preparer. But in 1998, Dimitra's mother, T.R. Seiler, known to many as Dolly, started working part-time at the library. When the bookkeeper's position opened up, she called Dimitra and asked, "Do you have your resume ready?" Dimitra started working here in March 2001.
