
From the Director's Desk







For over 30 years, the Adult Literacy Program has been pairing trained volunteer tutors with adults wishing to improve their literacy skills. Each year, our tutors help over 140 adults, whether they are interested in improving their reading and writing skills, or learning English for the first time. In addition, our tutors help students study for tests necessary to move forward in their careers, including the high school equivalency test. With the help of our terrific tutors, our students gain employment, enter educational or vocational programs, become U.S. citizens, and become more empowered members of our community. Since all of our programs are free of charge, we rely on the support of the community to continue this effort.





Staff Spotlight – Michael Rechel



Maybe you ask a librarian, or consult the card catalog. Maybe you just head to your favorite author, or your favorite section, and let serendipity take its course. But you do generally walk out with the book you came in for. And that is the magic of cataloging.

Michael Rechel is the Head of our and, thanks to tuition remission, Technical Services Department. He oversees the processing of every item that is purchased or donated to the library. It is a daunting task, but Michael brings to it a wealth of experience.

Raised in Williamsport, Pa., he attended the Eastman School of Music at the University of Rochester, with the intention of becoming a music teacher. But opera stole his heart. In the absence of a major in opera production and direction, he created his own, at one point taking four German and three Italian classes simultaneously. (His ability to perfectly decline a German sentence didn't much impress his Italian professor.) Deciding not to teach, he chose to pursue a graduate degree in musicology, which required him to find some way of paying the rent and eating. He took a job at the Sibley Music Library in 1975, 1999. These were records that

was able earn his master's degree in library science.

In the winter of 1977, 20 feet of snow fell in Rochester and chased him down to Philadelphia, where he became a cataloging librarian at Bryn Mawr College. There he developed a lasting love of archaeology, particularly Bronze Age Aegean art. Bryn Mawr was followed by stints at the N.J. State Library; as an editor for Catholic Library Association; and as director of the Pitman (N.J.) Public Library and Head Librarian at the East Cheltenham Library, before finally returning to his roots, cataloging, here at Abington.

When Michael arrived here in 2002, he discovered 10,000 records of items that had been cataloged "on-the-fly" when the library adopted barcodes in essentially had no information in item, save a barcode and a call number. Michael and his staff doggedly tracked down every single one of them and properly cataloged them, so people could find the titles they were looking for. At the end of that mammoth project, in 2005, he was presented with a large ceramic fly, which still adorns his desk.

But what of opera? He channeled that passion into a series of cats he adopted over the years. In order, Boheme, Tosca, twins Mimi and Rudi, Mario, Lucia, Giorgietta and Isadora. Presently, he is the fond human of Thais and Sophie.

So the next time you walk into the library and find exactly what you want, thank the alchemy of cataloging and our wizard of same, Michael Rechel.
