When you visit the library's website (www.abingtonfreelibrary.org) you will see the "Search Everything" button next to the "Search Catalog" button. Search Everything will search, well, nearly everything the library has to offer: the online catalog, Power Library, other databases and the library website! Links to many of the library's other online resources will appear to the right of the search results.

WHAT TO READ NEXT?



As reference librarians, we often assist patrons with reading recommendations. The tools we use are also available to you. Novelist, for example, is embedded in the catalog. When you search the online catalog, choose to view the full display for a favorite book, then scroll down to "Reading Recommendations, Reviews, and More." If the book is part of a series you can see details there, too.

Another tool we use is Book SnapShots, which offers book descriptions and lists of titles for all ages. Once you delve into one of the lists, you can find read-a-likes, too.

How does a

book - or film or music CD —

make its way to the library shelf, ready for you to discover, check out, take home and enjoy?

While it's tempting to say it begins with a spark of an idea in the mind of an author, that may be stretching things a bit, in terms of what we at the library can take credit for. Nevertheless, there are more steps involved than you might imagine.

The process begins in our Reference department. Each week our knowledgeable and dedicated reference librarians choose new titles to order, based on critical reviews, reader demand, collection development, and budget allowances.

How Materials Make their Way to the Library Shelf

Nancy handles the DVDs; Carolyn and Jessica choose children's titles; Lindsay those for teens; Gloria stays on top of adult fiction; Mimi, Lois, Jay, Brian, and Anna handle nonfiction; and Meg fills out the Roslyn Branch collection. Together, they cover nearly every topic imaginable! Once their lists are compiled, the process moves to the Technical Services department.

In Tech Services, our acquisitions assistant, Susan, places the orders with our vendors. Many titles arrive the very next day. Susan unpacks the items and updates the online inventory. The materials are not free, of course: Invoices are tallied and sent to Dimitra, our fiscal manager, for payment. Meanwhile, the items themselves go to Heather, Sherrie, and Jeanne — our cataloging team.

The catalogers create detailed online records for each item, showing title, author, subject, call number, publication date and more. Their hard work, handling nearly 9,000 titles each year, helps make it possible for you to find just what you want in the library.

Next the items move on to Belinda and her crafty team of "shelf-prep" volunteers, while Roslyn materials head across town to Caitlin's desk. They ensure every item is attractive and durable. Books are covered with protective laminate; audiovisual materials are fitted to security cases; cover artwork is sized to fit; and identifying spine label stickers are added.

Now the items are checked in, appearing at last in the online catalog. Off they go to the Circulation desk, where, finally, our tireless pages file each one in its proper place on the shelves, ready for your perusal.

All of this is performed quickly and accurately, in a matter of days, so we can get the materials to you. The next time you take home that gripping novel, eyeopening nonfiction, or stack of children's picture books, we hope you will appreciate the many steps involved, and the dedicated and hard-working staff that make it all possible.

And as for that author with the spark of an idea, if she or he spends time in a library inspired by works on the shelves, informed by research, aided by able staff, or simply enjoying a quiet place to work — libraries can indeed take some credit in the very first steps of creating the works that eventually find their way to you.
