This Spotlight usually shines on staff and volunteers, but this month we just couldn't resist telling you about library assistant Kathleen Zimmerman's musical son, Tyler Zimmerman. Tyler realized he wanted to sing opera when he was about six years old, after his parents took him and his brother to a production of A Midsummer Night's Dream at the Academy of Music. There were opera singers in the pit, and he decided he was going to sing like that one day.

Spotlights on Tyler Zimmerman and Don

His musical education had already started, at age 3, when he was enrolled in basic music classes at the Settlement School of Music. Tyler was also lucky enough to attend schools in the Abington School District, which was just honored as a Best Community for Music Education for the 12th year in a row.

When his voice changed at 13, Tyler began voice lessons with Ruth Ideen-Sall and, two years later, he was accepted to Juilliard's Pre-College Division.

Tyler completed his undergraduate studies and a year of his master's at the Juilliard School, before transferring to the Curtis Institute of Music. Throughout training, he worked with Marlena Kleinman Malas, who

continues to be his voice teacher.

Tyler has performed in various cities throughout the U.S., including New York, Philadelphia, Albany, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Santa Fe, and Chautauqua.

While an apprentice at the Santa Fe Opera, Tyler was lucky enough to be included in the creation of a new work, *The* (*R*)*evolution of* Steve Jobs, by Mason Bates, and performed in the world premiere as an ensemble soloist. A recording from those first performances won a Grammy this year for Best Opera.

So, yes, next time you see Kathleen, just remember: her son won a Grammy.

• Abington and Roslyn Libraries offer museum passes to Township residents, granting free admission to about 20 museums and cultural institutions in the Philadelphia area. Abington Library recently added the National Constitution Center to its museum pass collection. The pass to Chanticleer Gardens, open seasonally, is now available. The Roslyn Branch offers four passes, including one for the Bucks County Children's Museum.



Now in its 35th year, our Adult Literacy Program has helped thousands of people improve their literacy skills. Some of our volunteers help adults who are trying to learn English. They work on improving their English reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills so they can better acclimate to the U.S. Other tutors work on language and academic skills with English-speaking adults, helping them prepare for tests, enter secondary education, or find a better job. In addition to individual tutoring, we offer small-group classes for English learners to practice their skills in a supportive environment.

We are fortunate to live in a community that not only values literacy, but is also rich with talented people who are willing to help others. Please consider becoming a volunteer tutor. No experience is necessary! Volunteers attend a sevenhour training program for new tutors, which is offered three times a year. Our next training session will be held over three evenings in July.
