From our Director

So far this year 350,000 people visited the Abington Free Library, and 19,000 visited the Roslyn Branch. We hope you were one of them. If not, we hope you will visit us soon so that you can discover what so many of your neighbors already know: our libraries have something for everybody!

In 2007, our Reference Department added <u>The Philadelphia Inquirer Historical Archives</u> database, 1860 to 1922. We continue to offer wireless access to the Internet. This is a huge benefit to students and businesspersons who frequent the library. By the end of this year we will have installed all new public workstations. We know that keeping current in this age of technology is of utmost importance to our library users. We take the needs of our patrons seriously.

Our Young Adult Department added some popular events to its list of continuing favorites. We held an SAT preparation course (with a complimentary continental breakfast!) and a workshop for high school students and parents on the college admissions process. At Roslyn, our librarian worked with teen volunteers who created programs for children, including a juggling workshop and Japanese manga drawing lessons.

Story times for babies, toddlers and preschoolers are held throughout the year at both libraries. Summertime brings the popular Science in the Summer programs to Abington, while both libraries host the Summer Reading Club, arts

and crafts programs and performances by entertainers of all kinds. Our children's librarians also visit local schools, partner with the Center for Parenting Education and work closely with local homeschoolers.



We offer so much to our adult and senior patrons as well: tax help, daytime book discussion groups, one-on-one computer classes, and the BookCellar, our fabulous book store.

The Abington Township Public Libraries need the help of their patrons to sustain this level of service and to continue to improve it for you. We want to provide you with up-to-the-minute technology, the latest books, audiobooks and DVDs, programs that are relevant and entertaining, and a community center that is comfortable and welcoming. Therefore, we need your help.

The purpose of this letter is two-fold. If you're not already taking advantage of everything the Abington Free Library and our Roslyn Branch have to offer, we invite you to come in, look around, talk to a librarian and become part of our library family. Volunteer Spotlight – Ashley and Joseph Tsung

So long, Batman and Robin - the Abington Free Library Children's Department has its own "Dynamic Duo" in longtime volunteers Ashley and Joseph Tsung. Now in ninth and eighth grades, respectively, at Abington Junior High School, Ashley and Joseph have been collating children's program flyers, making promotional buttons, and shelving materials for three years now.

The siblings' association with Abington Free Library began sometime around kindergarten, when they enrolled in the Summer Reading Club. While most children typically complete one reading log by summer's end, Ashley and Joseph each turned in a whopping four or more. Needless to say, the Children's Department staff took notice of this highly motivated pair. Ashley and Joseph continued to participate in the Summer Reading Club, among other library programs, through the sixth grade.

Today the siblings are powerhouse shelvers, each dedicating two or more hours per week to pushing book carts. Both students aced the library's Dewey Decimal shelving test three years ago, and their skills have become even more polished since then.

In addition to volunteering at the library, Ashley and Joseph are involved in Teens Against Drugs and Alcohol (TADA), the National Junior Honor Society, and their church choir and youth group. Ashley is co-president of the junior high's Builders Club,



while Joseph made the seventh-grade baseball team last year. Both take lessons in violin and Chinese, and are gaining travel experience through the People to People Student Ambassadors program. Last year Ashley toured France, Italy and Greece; this year Joseph plans to visit London and France.

What have these two learned from their volunteer experiences at the library? "Shelving is not as easy as it looks," admits Ashley. Both enjoy seeing the new books that come in, and Joseph likes using the button machine. Hard-working, capable and reliable, these two are a welcome sight whenever books start piling up. Three cheers for our very own superheroes!

The Philadelphia Inquirer Historical Archive is a recent acquisition that we are very happy to boast about. The purchase of this database, which covers the years 1860 to 1922, was made possible by contributions from the Friends of the Library and funds from our collection budget.

All patrons can search the archive in the library, but only Abington Library card holders can search this database from home. In addition, we are able to provide our patrons (and all Montgomery County residents) with both in-house and remote access to *The Philadelphia Inquirer* from 1981 to the current date. This is made possible through a purchase made by our District Library, Norristown Public Library.

NewsBank provides the electronic form of *The Philadelphia Inquirer*. NewsBank is in the process of obtaining copyright for the remaining gap (1923-1980) of the online newspaper.



Where can you find the latest best seller fiction title for \$5, and many other titles for much less? The best bargains are found at the Abington Library, where a

wonderful fiction book sale is ongoing upstairs. Come peek at the variety of titles in hardcover and trade paperback formats.

Many patrons have taken advantage of this sale, which is made possible by the many book donations so generously given by our library users. Sometimes a bargain book is bought, read, then donated again and bought again! All proceeds from the sale go to our Friends of the Library, who then use it in various ways to help improve our libraries.

Twice a year in June and December, we have a 25-cent book sale. Every title is marked 25 cents for the whole month. If you are looking for gifts (and yes, many books are in such pristine condition that they look like they just came from Barnes & Noble), or just looking for books to relax with, this is the time to come look for bargains.

Since 2001, our patrons have donated over 5,000 different fiction titles, over 1,400 different mystery titles, and over 350 different science fiction titles. My trusty database contains all this nifty information. We have added many titles to our collection, and replaced many old copies with the newer copies. In 2006 alone, we added 409 fiction titles (including paperbacks and out-of-print books), replaced 583 fiction titles, and sold over 4,000 fiction books. Thank you, library users, for your enormous generosity and for bargain hunting here! Hooray for all book and library lovers!

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Staff Spotlight - Katie Gaines

Normally, librarians are not as associated with coffee as say, programmers. But Katie Gaines is our queen of decaf. As you might guess, she is enthusiastic, energetic and perpetually excited. She works part time in our children's department, but part time only describes her hours. There is nothing part-time about the contributions she makes to the library.

Katie was born in Cleveland, Ohio. Like many fathers of his era, Katie's father suggested teaching as a secure career, so she dutifully went off to American University to study education. Her husband still remembers the time and place, during second semester, that they met. He also claims that their small, home-based wedding was the nicest he ever attended.

She left that job when her son was born, and started as librarian at the Meadowbrook School when he was 3. She was there for 10 years and then took some time off to reflect.

It was then that the former director of Abington Library called and asked if she'd like to do a couple of story hours and perhaps cover the children's desk during lunch breaks. Katie said yes, and she's been here ever since. Katie still does story hours; she also is responsible for ordering most of the books for all ages up to third grade. Her enthusiasm for picture books is infectious.

Katie loves the children who come in and she loves watching the myriad people who pass the children's desk on their way to other programs. In her spare time, she likes to read (of course), do crossword puzzles, Sudoku, play mah-jongg and crochet. She hates to cook but loves to eat. She loves the shore most of all and is lucky to have a house in Margate. Her coworkers in the children's department appreciate her enthusiasm and excitement and her willingness to help others.
