Adult Literacy Program

For over 30 years, the Adult Literacy Program has been pairing trained volunteer tutors with adults looking to improve their literacy skills. Our tutors help over 100 adults increase their job prospects and gain confidence by helping them improve their reading and writing skills. We help students prepare for their high school equivalency diploma, the GED and other tests, and work with foreign-born residents learning English for the first time. We also offer

small-group classes for English language learners to practice their English skills as they learn about our government and culture.

We will be training new tutors on Oct. 20 and Oct. 27, in the evening. We also offer training for our volunteer tutors on various topics throughout the year. LearningExpress Library has a new look and updated resources. This web library offers a variety of learning centers for all ages. Whatever your goal, LearningExpress Library can help you succeed at school, at work or in life. Resources include:

Adult Learning Center: Build math, writing and reading skills; prepare for graduate school; prepare for U.S. citizenship test.

<u>Career Center:</u> Try entrance exam practice tests; learn about careers and workplace skills; explore military and officer training.

College Preparation Center: Find help for taking tests – ACT, SAT, AP, TOEFL and THEA – and college essay writing.

High School Equivalency: Learn about basic skills; try a GED practice test (or GED in Spanish) and social science, math and language arts practice tests.
