Of course, she does so much more that you can't see, including processing purchase orders, linking serial records, and preparing all the legal, medical and financial newsletters that we carry.

Shibani was born and raised in Calcutta, India. She comfortably speaks three languages, Bengali, Hindi and English. Her father worked for India Railway, which meant her family got to ride first class all over the country. As a child, she saw most of India: from cooling river cruises in Kerala, and



A few resources of note are:


Gale Virtual Reference Library (GVRL), which offers encyclopedias and specialized reference sources on a variety of topics from history, government, environment and math.
